Development 'road map' nearing review

An update of the Village's Comprehensive Plan is heading into the home stretch, with the Plan Commission scheduled to begin public hearings on the final draft at its August 9 meeting.

Crafted in the last year by a 16-member committee aided by a planning consultant, the document would update the 2004 Comprehensive Plan and become the latest "road map" for future development decisions. Once approved by the Glenview Village Board of Trustees, the Comprehensive Plan is intended to guide the Village in its planning efforts for the next 10 to 20 years.

The process began with a collection of data and review of plans that were created as part of past studies, such as the Bicycle and Sidewalk Master Plan, the Capital Improvement Plan, Downtown Revitalization Code, the Milwaukee and Waukegan Corridor plans and the Plan for Nature in Glenview.

Public participation was essential to ensure the Comprehensive Plan update reflects community feedback. Outreach efforts beginning in June 2015 generated input and ideas from several hundred citizens participating through focus groups, one-on-one interviews, workshops, open houses and committee meetings.

Early on, the Comprehensive Plan Committee recognized the importance of protecting Glenview's unique and diverse residential neighborhoods. It identified a set of shared com-

munity values that went into developing a vision statement to guide the Plan (see box to left).

A portion of the Plan update focuses on redevelopment opportunities that could arise over time, as development trends, pressures and practices change. By providing guidance and encouraging improvements for sites subject to changing market forces, opportunities to improve those areas can benefit the entire community.

Eight such subareas – and four secondary subareas – have been

included for evaluation. While none are currently slated for vacancy or redevelopment, recommendations made in the plan are intended to be useful years down the road. Among the subareas are:

- The 12-acre parcel at the southwest corner of Old Willow Road and Willow Road, currently a mix of warehouse, light office, manufacturing and home services
- The Lehigh Industrial Corridor, off Lehigh Avenue and north of Chestnut Avenue, which is close to The Glen and adjacent to Gallery Park
- The 19.4-acre Pearson Education site, currently occupied with office buildings and paved parking lots
- An office building on the Signode campus at Pffingsten Road and West Lake Avenue, which was ITW's former corporate office location and is currently adjacent to residential uses

This month in history



85 years ago – July 17, 1931

The Village Board of Trustees made it unlawful to beg or solicit rides from motorists, with the intention of being transported without payment of a fare.

45 years ago – August 28, 1971

Ron Santo Day was proclaimed in Glenview, the same day the Cubs honored their third baseman – a Glenview resident – with Ron Santo Day at Wrigley Field.

35 years ago – July 6, 1981

Knowingly activating a burglar alarm in order to summon police, with no actual attempted unauthorized entry on the premises, was made punishable by a fine in Glenview.

25 years ago – August 2, 1991

The Village Board of Trustees voted to participate in the Illinois one-call notice system known as JULIE – the Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators (see page 5).



Dispose of worn flags properly

“The Flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem of display, should be destroyed in a dignified way,” according to the United States Flag Code. There are two places to dispose of flags in Glenview:

- The patriotic-painted collection box at the corner of Glenview Road and River Drive (near the Veterans Memorial)
- The recycling center in the lobby at Village Hall, 2500 East Lake Avenue

Village want to see on this site?” and prescriptively identifies the opportunities and issues that would need to be addressed in conjunction with any future development request.

A section on transportation provides ideas about where improvements can be made relative to circulation and open space. These include:

- increased mobility
- designing multi-modal roadways for vehicles, bicycles and pedestrians
- connectivity to public transportation
- mitigating impacts of trains passing through the community
- a friendly environment for bicyclists and pedestrians
- major intersection improvements

When adopted, this will be the fifth update to this foundational policy document. The first was named “Planning with Glenview” when it was adopted in 1954. It was revised in 1960 and again in 1990 prior to the redevelopment of the Glenview Naval Air Station, with the last revision occurring in 2004.

As important as public engagement was at the beginning of the current update process, residents’ thoughts about how they’d like Glenview to grow and change in the future are equally as important during the Plan Commission’s review of the proposed document. From the Village President

If you read the Vision Statement developed by the Comprehensive Plan Committee on the front page of this newsletter, you know that Glenview “takes great pride in ensuring it’s an engaging place for every age and stage of life.”

This community offers a variety of services intended to make living here more convenient and welcoming. Many of these services are budgeted for and offered for no charge by the Village. But they are only helpful if citizens know about them and take advantage of them.

Here are just a few:

- Residents are required to obtain a license for dogs and cats. One reason is to make it easier to identify lost or injured pets and quicker to return them. There’s no fee, and the tag with a registration number is provided free by the Village. In order to register, the owner must have proof of rabies inoculation – another safeguard for your pet as the number of animals testing positive for rabies in the Chicago area is on the increase. License application forms can be found online at: glenview.il.us/Pages/PetRegistration.aspx.
- Likewise, registering your bicycle increases the chance of it being returned if it is lost or stolen, and there is no fee. The registration form is available online at glenview.il.us/Pages/bikeregistration.aspx. Once submitted by email, mail or in person at the Glenview Police Department, you’ll receive a sticker that should be applied to the bar located underneath the bicycle seat, facing forward.
- More than 275 residents participated in the National Missing Children’s Day event hosted by the Glenview Police Department in May. Child identification kits were prepared free of charge, then given to parents for self-keeping with no duplicate kept. Plans are to offer this event again next year.
- The Village puts out information about construction, alerts about inclement weather and notifications of events around the community. All you have to do is sign up to get it sent to you.
 - You can receive alerts about local emergencies quickly through the Village’s Emergency Notification System via emails and text messages in addition to telephone calls. Sign up online at: glenview.il.us/Pages/EmergencyNotificationSystem.aspx

One thing residents don’t have to worry about getting is a Glenview vehicle sticker. The Village Board of Trustees eliminated the annual sticker in 1998. The Police Department has access to an excellent state data base that meets our needs, so this duplicative program was eliminated.

Glen street resurfacing begins early July

Resurfacing work is scheduled to begin July 5 on the major roads that run through The Glen – Patriot Boulevard, West Lake Avenue west of Patriot, and Chestnut Avenue west of Lehigh. Along with a new asphalt surface, repairs will be made to sidewalks, curbs and gutters.


Once the preparation work and repairs are completed – and weather permitting – paving is anticipated to start in late July on the portions marked in blue in the map at right, and in late August on the portions marked in red. This work is expected to be completed by mid-October 2016.

The Glen's major stem roads were built between 1998 and 2001, as the former Glenview Naval Air Station was being redeveloped into The Glen.

Typically with new developments, the final roadway surface course is not placed until after 90 percent of the homes or businesses are occupied. That way, the wear and tear from construction traffic is limited.

But the final surface course was applied earlier in the case of The Glen because the roads served as major connectors through the community.

Note: This project's status is subject to IDOT's budgetary authority to proceed from the Governor's office and the General Assembly.



It was necessary to make the streets as complete as possible to ease traffic flow through Glenview and facilitate private development in The Glen. As expected, heavy construction traffic throughout The Glen accelerated deterioration of the roadways.

The Village earlier had worked with the Illinois Department of Transportation to secure designations of The Glen main stem roads as Federal Aid Routes, making them eligible for federal funds. The Village also secured federal Surface Transportation Program (STP) approval to cover about 70 percent of the total resurfacing project costs.

Additionally, the cost of resurfacing the main stem roads was calculated as part of the Glen's Tax Increment Financing (TIF) District, the economic tool being used to pay The Glen's redevelopment costs.

The roadways will remain open while the work is being done, but motorists may experience delays at times. Get traffic updates online at: glenview.il.us/Pages/Glen_streets.aspx.

Following this year's work, Lehigh Avenue and West Lake Avenue from Patriot to Lehigh

will be resurfaced in 2017.

Recycle electronics, shred papers

Televisions, computers and other electronics are banned from going into Illinois landfills. So take advantage of this year's one-day electronics recycling event from **9 a.m. to noon Saturday, July 16**, in the Glenview Municipal Center parking lot, 2500 East Lake Avenue. Acceptable items include: computers, monitors, cable receivers, computer cable, converter boxes, DVD players, fax machines, keyboards, mouse controllers, mobile telephones, MP3 players, PDAs, printers, satellite receivers, scanners, TVs, video game consoles, VHS players and zip drives. Additionally, drop off up to six file-size boxes or shopping bags of documents for shredding. Destroying sensitive documents helps prevent identity theft.





Take care to keep your summer fun

While you're having fun this summer, keep in mind some preventative maintenance tips so your property looks good and stays safe.

Mow the lawn

Every summer, the Village receives complaints from residents whose neighbors let weeds take over their yards or the grass grow too high.

Weeds and grass (excluding garden plants and native plantings) must not exceed eight inches in height, under the Village Code.

Be a good neighbor and regularly mow and maintain your lawn and public parkway. Even if you aren't currently residing on the property, its maintenance is still your responsibility.

Failure to comply with Village Code can lead to tickets, and could result in fines of between \$100 and \$1,000 per day, per violation.

Be a safe griller

Avoid injuries and property damage due to outdoor cooking. A few safety precautions can ensure everyone enjoys a barbecue party.

Propane and charcoal barbecue grills must only be used outdoors. Do not use them in a garage or tent because of the fire hazard and risk of exposure to deadly carbon monoxide



poisoning. For rules about grills on balconies, check with your building management or homeowners association.

Place the grill safely away from lawn games, play areas and foot traffic. Grills should be positioned at least 10 feet away from siding and deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.

Keep matches, lighters and starter fluid out of reach of children, and keep children and pets away from the grill area.

Protect the chef by using long barbecue mitts and long-handled grilling tools. Periodically remove grease or fat build-up from the grill and trays below the grill so it cannot be ignited.

Secure the house

While you're outside playing, criminals are looking for any opportunity to get into your house.

Don't forget to close doors or windows when you leave. Garage doors in particular are regularly used to gain access to a home, and open garages offer up items to steal.

Be wary of strangers who come to your door offering to do repair work. While you're being distracted, a partner could be sneaking into the garage backyard or home to quickly grab items.



Call before you dig

You may be surprised by what's buried in your yard. Most electric, gas, water, sewer and telecommunications companies are delivering utility services underground. To avoid personal injury and damage to those underground lines, state law requires you to contact JULIE (the Joint Utility Locating Information Excavators) before any digging project, regardless of the project size or depth, such as decks, patios, trees, swing sets, signs, fountains, tents, fences, mailbox posts, room additions, gardens, swimming pools and landscaping.

Call 811 or (800) 892-0123. Or go online to illinois1.com to place a local request. Both the call and JULIE's services are free. Marking your yard may take a day or two. Respect the markings and always dig with care.

The Village of Glenview maintains a potable water system that supplies homes with drinking water. As a water supplier, the Village is required by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency and local regulations to protect its water system from contamination. One such requirement is having a Cross Connection Control Program.

A cross connection is a connection between the Village's drinking water supply and a non-potable water source, such as a lawn irrigation system, pool, hot tub/spa, fire sprinkler system or boiler. Where cross connections occur, it is possible for non-potable water to flow into the Village's potable water supply when pressure changes occur. This is known as backflow.

If your property has a non-potable water source, you are required by Village ordinance to have a backflow prevention assembly to prevent backflow, as required by the IEPA.

Local regulations protect the water system from contamination.

Poll workers sought for election



The Cook County Clerk's Office is seeking poll workers for the November 8, 2016 presidential election. Election judges are paid \$175 and equipment managers are paid \$325 for serving in a suburban Cook County polling place.

State law requires local party officials – township committeemen who represent the Democratic and Republic parties – to appoint and place election judges. Five election judges total are needed for each precinct or polling place. Responsibilities include: opening and closing the polling place, setting up election equipment, providing assistance to voters and other duties.

Additionally, the Cross Connection Control Program mandates annual testing of backflow prevention assemblies in the water system where cross connections exist. Annual testing ensures that the backflow prevention assemblies are in proper working order, and mitigates the risk of non-potable water entering the Village's potable water supply.

The Village has contracted with Backflow Solutions, Inc., which manages the Village's cross connection control program. To protect our drinking water, the program requires homeowners to do several things:

- Complete a survey to let the Village know if they have a non-potable water source at their residence and/or a backflow prevention assembly.
- Have a backflow prevention assembly installed if there is a non-potable water source
- Have the backflow prevention assembly annually tested and certified by a licensed, certified backflow prevention assembly tester
- Have the certified cross connection control device inspector who installs or tests the backflow prevention device submit the testing report to the Village through Backflow Solutions, Inc.

This mandated program has at its core keeping Glenview's drinking water free from impurities and health hazards, an issue of public safety.

Village Board in brief

The Village Board of Trustees met June 7 and 21. Here is a summary of actions taken:

◆ Approved a conditional use, final site plan review and final subdivision that would allow the operation of a craft brewery with accessory tap room, an I-2 Light Industrial District use, in the B-2 General Business District, for Macushla Brewing, a 1,900-square-foot tenant space at 1516 East Lake Avenue.

◆ Vacated a portion of the right of way adjacent to the parcel known as “Cardinal Triangle,” near Lehigh Avenue and Cardinal Road. The intention is to transfer the parcel to the Glenview Park District along with an adjacent lot to the west to allow ongoing maintenance of the parcel as natural area.

◆ Authorized a contract award to Morton Salt Inc. of Chicago to obtain 1,000 tons of rock salt through a procurement process led by Lake County, involving more than 40 municipalities, during fiscal year 2016 for up to \$58,570.

◆ Awarded a contract to Glenbrook Excavating and Concrete Inc. to construct two new water connections to supply wholesale water to the Village of Golf, at the intersections of Overlook/Country and Overlook/Crabtree, and amended the 2016 Village budget to reflect the up to \$390,825 design, inspection and construction costs, which will be covered by the Village of Golf upon completion of the project.

◆ Voted to support applications for

Illinois Transportation Enhancement Program (ITEP) grant funding for three projects:

- An 8- to 10-foot wide multi-use path on the north side of the widened Chestnut Avenue from Waukegan Road to Lehigh Avenue
- Additional streetscape improvements along Glenview Road from the Metra railroad tracks to Washington Street
- Complete Phase I engineering for the Skokie Valley Trail segment within Glenview, in conjunction with the villages of Northfield, Wilmette and Skokie.

If awarded, the federal grants will provide 80 percent of the total project cost.

◆ Approved a special event permit for the ninth annual Summer Sounds Concert series on Tuesday nights from June 28 to August 30 at The Glen Town Center in Navy Park, including permission to sell and consume beer and wine on the premises; and approved temporary traffic ordinances to control vehicular parking and road closures between 12 p.m. and 10 p.m.

◆ Approved a special event permit for Amdur Productions to hold Art at The Glen Town Center from August 5-7, and approved temporary traffic amendments to the Municipal Code to facilitate street closures and parking.

◆ Amended the Village Municipal

Code regarding commuter parking in response to Amtrak’s removal of its ticket agent at the downtown train station, in order to address Amtrak parking, including the issuance of multi-day parking permits, at a \$2 per day charge, to Amtrak customers in 10 designated spaces south of Dewes Street, effective August 1, 2016.

◆ Approved a final site plan review and commercial variations to allow the construction of four building additions and 90 new parking stalls at Kohl Children’s Museum, 2100 Patriot Boulevard, to allow for additional exhibit space and better circulation patterns, and fewer than the required number of landscaped islands in the parking lot.

◆ Accepted the Village’s Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2015, for which the auditors issued an unmodified “clean” audit opinion.

◆ Approved a resolution to comply with the Illinois Prevailing Wage Act, which requires contractors and subcontractors to pay workers covered under the Act employed on public works construction projects a wage no less than the general prevailing rate of wages in the county where the work is performed.
